One Chinese Student's Search for Truth

YOUNG MAN stepped into the United States with frustration and uncertainty about the future. He'd had no interaction with Americans or American culture until he applied for graduate school. Treated unfairly by one university during the admissions process, he now felt angry toward America. Yet through simple acts of kindness, God began to change his heart. This is Tim Chen's true story.

I was born and raised in a traditional Chinese atheistic family. My parents didn't believe in any god, but they admired the civilization and freedom of America. Before I came to America for graduate school, all I knew about the country was from textbooks, movies, and media.

The process of applying for graduate school in the United States was not a pleasant experience for me. One university had offered me admission, but when I declined all other offers and was about to accept theirs, one of the professors rejected my enrollment for no apparent reason. And to make

it worse, that professor was originally from China. God showed his mercy, however, through another university which offered me a second admission after I had declined the first. I didn't appreciate this renewed opportunity, though, because of my frustration.

On the first day I went to campus in America, I was holding a map and walking around. Quite a lot of people came to me and asked: "Do you need help? May I show you somewhere?" I was very surprised. Why did the professor treat me, his own Chinese fellow, unfairly, while the Americans showed their best kindness and hospitality to me, a foreigner?

As I was looking to find the reason for American kindness, I found it in an unlikely place—on the money. You know, it is printed "In God We Trust" on the back of every dollar. I thought this God must be what makes Americans so exceptional. I wanted to know who this God is. So I went to a welcome party held by the Chinese church. I continued to get to know Christians in the Chinese church. China Outreach Ministries welcomed me, too, and I even went to a COM retreat where Daniel Su was speaking.

At a gospel camp, I met the Lord. The speaker talked about scientific facts to show the existence of God, such as the distance between Earth and the sun that is perfect for appropriate tem-



peratures. This made sense to me, and I agreed with him about an intelligent creator. Then he talked about Jesus. He said that for God to accomplish his plan, he sent his only son Jesus to the world and let him die on the cross. He was resurrected from death, so that sinners could be saved. I was hesitant when I heard this message. This didn't fit with my views about life.

But I knew there must be purpose in the world. My thinking by this time was, what if his preaching was true—that the creator of the whole universe, the living God, wants to have a personal relationship with me, a tiny and miserable human being? I really had no reason to deny it. And if I denied it, I was gonna be in big trouble.

So I decided to accept Jesus as my Savior and to follow Him. And that is the best decision I've ever made. He changed my whole life. I used to speak with profanity, but I stopped. I used to think I was always right. I still debate sometimes, but I know that I am not always right—only God is. I am leading a small group in my church. To serve the Lord and people is not easy, and I still have negative emotions sometimes, but there is inner peace because God loves me no matter what.

■ I saw Chelsea's eyes brighten, and she started to ask questions about the Bible! Perhaps she just heard that we could find all the answers to life's questions in the Bible—such as the purpose for your life and, if there is a God, what He is like. She studied the first lesson and listened attentively. After that, she desired to know more. A few months later, Chelsea accepted Christ. It was joyful to hear her prayer, "Dear Lord, I've finally found what I can rely on and surrender myself to you..."

Forward Thinking, Unchanging Message

An Interview with Ken Wagoner, Vice President of Campus Ministries

TITH 30+ YEARS ON STAFF, Ken Wagoner serves as a campus worker in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, on the campuses of Carnegie Mellon, the University of Pittsburgh, and Duquesne University. He is also COM Vice President of Campus Ministries and one of eight area directors.

What has motivated you to persevere in this work over the years?

My main motivation is the biblical truth that God desires all the nations to know Him, love Him, and serve Him. One of the ways God is accomplishing this mission is through the overwhelming number of international students in the United States, and in particular the largest number being from China. I have seen God work in the lives of the Chinese scholars and students who return to China to influence family, friends, co-workers, and the culture of the country.

How did God lead you to China Outreach Ministries?

I was the pastor of a church near Johnstown, Pennsylvania, when I met Earnie Hummer, then the president of COM. As we developed a friend-ship over the following years, I shared with him that my wife and I wanted to always be open to God's leading, and

if he ever heard of a ministry which fit our abilities, gifts, and interests, I would consider it. Two years later the COM Board decided it was time to hire campus workers for campuses where there was a significant Chinese population. It took Earnie a while to convince me, but saying "no" to Earnie was never an easy thing.





How have Chinese students and scholars changed over the last 30 years?

Wow! Thirty-one years is a long time. Most of the scholars at that time had grown up during the Cultural Revolution. In 1988, the internet and email were not available to most people, and cell phones were not common. The majority of Chinese students and scholars in the United States today were born after the Tiananmen Square event. They know much more about western culture, their English proficiency is better, and they have more financial resources. They value experiential learning more than their parents. but there is much more competition for their time and attention.

What are some never-changing commitments of the ministry that you've witnessed?


People everywhere need to know two things: 1. They are loved. 2. They have value. These two needs are met in the biblical message of creation, fall, redemption, and restoration. This message is communicated through hospitality, friendship, and Christian love. God continues to use the followers of Jesus in His pursuit to reach others.

What excites you the most about the future of COM?

God has brought us some wonderful and gifted individuals who have the abilities, energy, and excitement to meet the changes we see in the current Chinese scholars and students. How our new staff will do their ministry will look much different than what I have done, but the message will be the same.

I think of those who have encouraged me these past 30+ years, and I am humbled by their regular and faithful prayers, letters, calls of encouragement, and generous giving. These are some of the major blessings COM has celebrated under Jeff's leadership:

- In 2007, COM raised approximately \$700,000 in a capital campaign for the new leadership center when the headquarters moved from Virginia to Pennsylvania. The center provides offices and meeting space for 10 staff members along with a conference area for staff training and work space for volunteer engagement.
- For COM's 50th anniversary in 2009, the "50 in 50" campaign raised funds to increase on-campus presence to 50 staff in COM's 50th year. The \$500,000 raised funded training, technology, materials, and equipment for the new staff.
- Through the "Planned Giving" program, COM is grateful to God for the generous contributions from key donors in recent years through estate plans and gift annuities. Through this funding, God has provided for COM to subsidize rising health care insurance costs for missionaries on campuses. This funding also helps COM conduct research pertaining to the outreach, along with provision for general operations.

It has been a blessing to get to know Jeff and Terry and see their faithfulness in serving the Lord. I wish God's blessings on them in their new adventure!

Kirk has served with COM for more than eight years on the campus of Penn State, most recently as team leader. "God has been preparing me all along the way," Kirk shares. Prior to joining COM, he worked in the corporate world for 20 years as an accountant and as a business manager/controller, using his college degree in accounting and business administration. What You Need to Know

In the fall of 2017 Congress passed the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act. This legislation made some significant changes to our tax laws, both for the benefit and sometimes to the detriment of taxpayers. Here are some quick reminders and possible ideas for giving under this new law.

- IRA Charitable Rollover law remains the same. Taxpayers age 70 ½ or older can still make qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) from their IRAs, directly to charities, up to \$100,000 per year. This may be a benefit to taxpayers dealing with the new higher standard deduction. See your financial advisor for more information.
- Donor-advised funds allow you to make a larger charitable contribution in one year that can be distributed to your charities over several years. This

- method may allow you to bunch contributions in any given year, putting your deductions above the new higher standard deduction (\$12,000 per individual or \$24,000 jointly; \$13,300 per individual over 65 or \$26,600 jointly).
- There are now limits on mortgage interest. State and local taxes are limited to \$10,000. Personal exemptions are eliminated.
- If you have remembered China Outreach Ministries in your estate plan (your will) and you have fully funded emergency and health care accounts, you may consider making a life income gift. A gift of cash or appreciated property can provide you with income for life and a tax deduction, and you may also avoid capital gains taxes.
